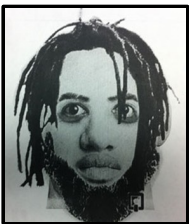

**Family:** Married to Officer Troy Still, A Recruit Coordinator at the Academy and four great kids (2 biological, 2 bonus!)

**Pet Peeves:** Too many to list but the one I've been complaining about the most lately is people talking on their speaker phones, loud enough for all surrounding offices to hear!!



**What is it you do for the Child Crisis Unit?** My job is to investigate all crimes against children including homicides, physical abuse, rapes, lewd molestations, neglect, exposure to drugs, and children in need of supervision.

**What is your most rewarding experience since working in the Detective Division?** Working Child Crisis is unique because you see the worst of the worst, people who harm children. However, there is nothing more rewarding than getting a confession from a child molester or a child abuser. When you see their heads drop and they finally tell you what they did! I have worked over 700 cases and sent dozens of people to prison for 25 years or more!! That is reward enough, knowing these guys can't harm children anymore.

**How did you become interested in Law Enforcement?** During college I participated in the ride along program (Thanks Mark Wollmershauser Sr!) and decided being a police officer would be a great way to serve my community, help people, take bad guys to jail, and drive cars really fast!!

**Detective Still has been with the Department for 18 ½ years and the Detective Division for almost 6 years.**

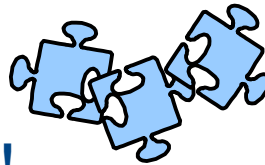

## Hard Hitting Detective Work!



Pablo Garmy, 32 and Omid Ahmadi, 35 were both arrested on extortion complaints after they arranged a meeting with Ahmadi's mother on Wednesday. The pair told Ahmadi's mother that Omid Ahmadi had been kidnapped and had arranged a ransom pick up of an undisclosed amount of money.

Robbery Detectives were directed to a local fast food restaurant where the pair showed up shortly after noon. Police quickly took the men into custody. Garmy had a warrant out for his arrest for an unrelated drug possession charge.

## Work a Cold Case...

**LISA HENDERSON**

On Friday June 1, 1979, 17-year old Lisa Ann Henderson left her residence at 7929 South 70th E. Pl. She told her brother she was going to see about a “modeling” job. When Lisa had not returned home by 5:00 p.m. that day her family became worried. They contacted her friends and co-workers but no one had seen or heard from her that day. A neighbor recalled seeing Lisa leave around noon that day carrying a plastic garment bag with several items inside.



The witness described the vehicle that she left in as a 1976-77 maroon Chevrolet Monte Carlo with no hubcaps and damage to the driver's side. The driver was a white male, approximately 40 years old, with dark thinning hair. This was the last time anyone saw Lisa alive. Henderson's body was found on June 11, 1979 in Wagoner County.
