**What is it you do for the Child Crisis Unit?** My job is to investigate all crimes against children. These crimes include homicides, physical abuse, rapes, lewd molestations, neglect, exposure to drugs, and children in need of supervision.

**What is your proudest moment as a detective?** My proudest moment came from working the Adorno case and finding justice for a handicap 4-year-old girl after her step-father raped her. I had a hard time locating the subject due to him using multiple aliases, however, with help from field officers we were able to locate the suspect. The suspect admitted to doing it once, but he did not remember what. Suspect will get at least 20 years and then be deported. I can't change what happened to her, but I put away the man who did it and now she is with a great family who loves her!

**What is the strangest request you've had from a citizen?** When I was working and doing undercover "John stings", a citizen propositioned me to do a "foot job".

### Karen Moncrief



On the afternoon of October 31<sup>st</sup>, 2007, Ms. Moncrief was shot at her apartment at 912 S. 95<sup>th</sup> East Avenue. She later died of her injuries.

Witnesses reported seeing a black male leaving her apartment an hour before Karen was found on her living room floor.

**Fingerprints Identify Residential Suspect** – On September 23<sup>rd</sup>, the Bank of Oklahoma at 3037 S. Garnett called officers in reference to suspect trying to pass a stolen check. Off. Richert arrived to find the suspect had fled. She learned the check was taken in a burglary, went to the scene and was able to recover fingerprints. Detective Tuell interviewed 20-year-old **Stephen Paige** and confessed based on the fact that fingerprints had been recovered. He has been charged with burglary.

## Statistics-

This past reporting period (Oct 3<sup>rd</sup> to Oct 30<sup>th</sup>) for incident reports regarding major crimes shows a decreased compared to the previous reporting period of Sept 5<sup>th</sup> to Oct 2<sup>nd</sup>. All Incident Reports for Serious Crimes, with the exception of aggravated assault, has declined by an average of 8 percent.
