File a Police Report

The Tulsa Police Department is available to investigate crimes 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. In case of an emergency always **CALL 9-1-1**. However, there are times when it is NOT an emergency and you'd just like to have an officer sent to your location, simply call **(918)596-9222**.

Did you know you can fill out a crime report online?

This online reporting system is provided for user convenience to report certain crimes that do not require the presence of a police officer. Use of this online system is entirely voluntary. You may only use the online [Citizens Crime Report](#) if you are reporting one of the following crimes:

Larceny, Larceny of Gasoline, Financial Crimes, Malicious Mischief/Vandalism, Harassing/ Threatening/Obscene Phone Calls, Other city misdemeanor offenses where there is no physical evidence and the suspect is not present.

When your report is processed in the Records Division, a number will be assigned and emailed to you. You must provide a valid email address in order to receive a report number by email. When you receive the number the report has been accepted and is on file. Visit the www.tulsapolice.org and click on the "Police Report" tab, for more information.

Coordination Amongst Agencies



On Saturday, November 12th, Police were called to the Red Crown Credit Union in Broken Arrow by bank employees in regards to a suspicious female who was attempting to cash an alleged fraudulent check. Cynthia Narro was taken into custody by Broken Arrow Police who then notified Tulsa Police.

Financial Crimes Detective Darin Shipley interviewed Narro regarding a list of pending fraudulent charges. Garfield county learned of her arrest as well and had put a Hold on her as well for a \$10,000 warrant regarding Elderly Fraud.

Cumulatively, Cynthia Narro has been charged with open charges for 1 Felony and 1 misdemeanor as well as, 2 felony warrants, and 2 misdemeanor warrants and the hold for her Garfield County warrant. Other pending investigations could result in additional charges to come.

At 12:40 p.m. on October 28, 1990 **Latrice Nicole Miller**, a 15 year old female, was found dead next to Haikey Creek under a bridge at 9100 S. Mingo Road.

The victim was discovered by a ten year old boy, who was walking to a friend's house.

One witness described a mid-70s, 2-door, Oldsmobile or Pontiac, beige or cream, parked at the bridge on October 26, 1990 at about 6:00 to 7:00 P.M... Another witness described a dark, 78-79 Camaro driving slowly and parking on the bridge at 11:00-11:15 P.M. on October 27, 1990.
