For those of you who may be lacking training hours for 2011, there are plenty of on-line courses to assist you in accumulating CLEET training hours.

CLEET has formed a partnership with the NCBRT, Louisiana State University and The Department of Homeland Security, to bring "eLearning" to peace officers in Oklahoma. The courses provided are recognized by CLEET as continuing education and may be used as part of the mandated yearly training requirement to maintain peace officer certification. There are eleven (11) on-line courses available with the courses ranging from one (1) to five (5) hours each. **What is it you do for the Major Crimes I Unit?** My responsibilities include searching for clues and evidence at crime scenes such as fingerprints, blood patterns, bullets, etc.

**What is your most rewarding/satisfying experience?** I'm always proud when I find a piece of evidence that is the key to convicting the bad guy. I'm lucky, in that my job puts me in a position to play an important role in many important cases.

**What has been your most interesting case ?** Unfortunately, the case that sticks in my head the most is the murder/suicide of Kaitelyn Jarvis and Kathy Jarvis. Kathy shot her daughter Kaitelyn in the head and heart as she slept in her bed. Kaitelyn was 12 at the time (about the same age as my son). Kathy then shot herself.

After Detectives identified a possible suspect, Bruner turned himself in within 24 hours of the incident. He was interviewed and subsequently arrested. He is charged with Felony Homicide and Robbery with a Dangerous Weapon.

Damont Payne, 21, was shot and killed after a confrontation inside an apartment at the Fairmont Apartments late Monday night. Investigations led The Homicide Detectives to Tyshawn Bruner, 20.
