## Detective in the Spotlight!



**Name:** Margaret Loveall

**Family:** I live in the Great Nation of the Osage with "My Man" Steve, our four dogs Jake, Xena, Boss and Bobbie, and our bird Dave.

**Pet Peeves:** People who break something then walk off leaving it broken for someone else to find and fix.

**Hobbies:** I am a Harley-Davidson enthusiast, and I enjoying sporting activities with my Rhodesian Ridgeback dogs.

**What is it you do for the Crime Scene Unit?** My responsibilities are to assist with processing Major Crime Scenes for evidence and to investigate Equivocal Deaths, Suicides, and Adult Missing Persons.

**What is your most rewarding experience since you joined the Detective Division?** There are several cases that come to mind, including the murders of Elizabeth Wagoner, Cori Baker, Mary Bowles and Gerald Thurman, that really showcase the tremendous amount of work done by many different Officers, Detectives and Scientists, all at different times and places, that culminate in the conviction of a suspect. Bringing justice to a Murder Victim and answers to their family is accomplished by many individuals working as a team. Being one small part of that team is its own reward.

**What is the strangest request you've had from a citizen?** A serial murderer once said that if we gave him a pack of a particular type of cigarettes he would sit in an interview and tell us all about what he had done. I went through the entire Municipal Courts building asking smokers what kind of cigarettes they smoked. I finally found someone with the right kind and basically mugged them of their cigarettes. I still have the remains of that pack in my desk. I also chatted online with a triple murder suspect, but I can't really tell you about that, I was told to keep the interview "tasteful".

**What has been the most unusual or interesting case you've ever had?** One would have to be "the Hammer Man". He is a serial killer and armed robber who preferred using a hammer as a weapon. He said you could not walk down the street with a knife or gun, someone would call the police on you. But a hammer? You could go anywhere and no one would look twice. I swear when he walks in a room the temperature drops. Very chilling. It was my great pleasure to testify about the evidence I recovered that sealed his conviction in the brutal hammer murder of an elderly Tulsa man, and to look him straight in the eye while I did it.

**I have been with the Department for 22 glorious years and the Detective Division long enough that my hair dye bill has tripled.**

## Heading into the New Year...

So many people find out too late they have become a victim of fraud. Today, more than ever, it is so easy for criminals to get a hold of your personal information. Financial Crimes Sergeant Detective Mark MacKenzie has a few tips to get you started in protecting your identity for the year 2012.

- Shred/destroy all sensitive documents that are no longer needed (old checks, credit cards, pay stubs, statements, etc). Don't throw them in the trash!
- Secure financial instruments (debit/credit cards, checks and related info) just like you would cash – in a safe/secure place.
- Realize you can be compromised or taken advantage of by anyone – even a family member. Someone could be tempted because of mere opportunity.

## Hard Hitting Detective Work!

On December 12<sup>th</sup>, an individual reported that his vehicle, located at 5300 E. 81<sup>th</sup> St., was broken into and his golf bag and clubs were stolen. The victim notified Play It Again Sports and informed them of the situation, giving a description of the stolen items. Later that day Jacob Spencer, 25, who was later identified, apparently walked into the same Sporting Good Shop and pawned the clubs. Recognizing

the golf clubs, the employee bought the clubs from Spencer and immediately notified the owner who then notified Detectives.

Spencer was located at his home today, where Detectives were able to recover the stolen golf bag in the corner of his bedroom. He was taken into custody and interviewed by Detectives. He has been arrested for Knowingly Concealing Stolen Property
