UCR's Revised Definition of Rape

Attorney General Eric Holder announced Friday, January 6th, revisions to the Uniform Crime Report's (UCR) definition of rape, which will lead to a more comprehensive statistical reporting of rape nationwide.

The new definition is more inclusive, better reflects state criminal codes and focuses on the various forms of sexual penetration understood to be rape.

The new definition of rape is: "The penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim." The definition is used by the FBI to collect information from local law enforcement agencies about reported rapes.

Since Mid-December, Burglary Detectives have noticed an increase of car break-ins in the area of 31st Street and Harvard area. One suspect, as it seemed, was caught on multiple video surveillance systems throughout the neighborhood stealing from cars parked in shopping centers and church parking lots.

The neighborhood was put on high alert, and it paid off. With so many eyes and ears watching out for a 4-door Silver Suzuki roaming the neighborhood, Mark Williams, 29, was quickly apprehended by RID field units on Tuesday, Jan 10th.

He is currently being held in the Tulsa County Jail for Unauthorized use of a Credit Card and Concealing Stolen Property. Burglary Detectives are expecting additional charges.
